COUNT CHECKLIST

The tally sheet has been re-designed. It is intended to help find species by family. Please provide us any feedback!

RARE BIRD reports are required for those marked " * " and for those not present on the checklist

Rare bird reports need to be filled out **ON BOTH PAGE SIDES** at the time of sighting with detailed location, time & species. CBCs are encouraged to submit digital photos for documentation of unusual and rare birds. It really makes it easier to judge the validity of the observation. Please see rare bird form instructions on providing them to us. **ALL HUMMINGBIRDS NEED A RARE BIRD REPORT**

EFFORT DATA

The effort data is moved to a separate sheet. PLEASE review the guidelines, on the website, to accurately detail the information. This is the one area where data is inconsistently captured every year.

COVID CONSIDERATION:

NEW FOR THIS YEAR BECAUSE OF COVID: BIRDER SPACING WILL BE GREATER THAN NORMAL FOR SAFETY. AUDUBON DOES NOT WANT YOU TO CONSIDER THE SPREADING OUT OF BIRDERS DUE TO COVID AS ADDITIONAL PARTIES. EXAMPLE – 4 PEOPLE USED TO BIRD A PROPERTY AS ONE PARTY AND STAYED WITHIN VOCAL CONTACT. DUE TO COVID THEY SPLIT INTO 2 GROUPS OF 2. THIS SHOULD BE CONSIDERED ONE PARTY AND THE MILEAGE AND TIME REPORTED SHOULD BE THE MAXIMUM FROM EITHER GROUP.

EBIRD LISTING SHARE your ebird lists with STRCLANWR

How can I use eBird for my Christmas Bird Counts? eBirding your Christmas Bird Counts (CBCs) is easy. **USE a personal location (not a hotspot or other locations) NAME IT with leading information CBC - <your area>in front of the pre-defined map location** then Just go eBirding as normal, and **make sure that any data collected during the CBC season is entered for single parties only—not parties that spend a lot of time split up. Split teams should make separate lists.** When eBirding your CBC, please keep different checklists for each location that you visit—this is much more valuable information than your entire sector. At the end of the day, use the Trip Summary on eBird Mobile for iOS, or the Summarize My Observations tool on My eBird, and quickly get a full day list.

IMPORTANT use of EBIRD does help us electronically retain historical data, HOWEVER, **YOU MUST transfer your ebird list to a paper tally sheet.** Take care that the two MATCH, AND abide by the need for **RARE BIRD reports** as defined by the tally sheet.

The paper copy MUST STILL BE TURNED IN AT THE END OF THE DAY.

ABOUT BIRDS

The Mangrove Yellow Warbler is no longer a Rare Bird!

All hummingbirds, except Buff-bellied must have a rare bird report.

Report "Rufous-type" Hummingbirds as Rufous/Allen's Hummingbird (*Selasphorus sp.*) unless you definitely know which it is and prepare a rare bird form (and photos if possible). Identification can only be made in the hand in the case of non-adult males.

Report Ruby-throated and Black-chinned Hummingbirds as Ruby-throated/Black-chinned (*Archilochus sp.*) unless you are very confident in your ability to identify and prepare a rare bird form (and photos if possible).

Be sure to have good reason to designate a **Meadowlark** as either eastern or western (*call preferred*). If not, then use meadowlark sp.

The designation **Couch's/Tropical Kingbird** should be used unless you can identify by vocalization.

Check all blackbird flocks for **Yellow-headed or Brewer's Blackbird**. These will require a rare bird form.

Check all vulture groups for **Zone-tailed Hawks**. This will require a rare bird form

Don't be afraid to use **sparrow sp.** If you cannot identify a sparrow.

Use **dowitcher sp.** Unless you have a reason to id it as long-billed or short-billed.

Use **Accipiter sp.** Unless field marks are obvious on Cooper's or Sharp-shinned Hawks.

Wild **mallards** are very rare for deep South Texas. Almost 100% seen here are domestic.

Please round all hours to the nearest quarter-hour, and all distances to the nearest quarter-mile.

Observers in the field during daylight are counted separately from nocturnal birders and those observing at feeders.

When reporting the minimum and maximum number of groups, include only parties in the field during daylight hours.

Minimum/Maximum Number of Groups: To determine the number of daylight parties, use the number of parties that you began the day with as your basic number. If groups further split up during the day, the maximum number in the field at any given time of the day should be reported, and the basic number becomes the minimum.

Example: Count Frozentoos, Alaska starts the day with 3 groups. Later, two of these split into two groups each. Record this as Minimum Number of Groups (daylight) = 3 and Maximum Number of Groups (daylight) = 5. Frozentoos, AK also had a group of counters out owling from 4:45 a.m. to 6 a.m., but this group is not included in the Minimum/Maximum Number of Groups.

Party hours and distance (By Foot, By Car, and By Other Transportation) are reported excluding feeder hours and nocturnal birding hours and distance.

Do not count miles backtracked. You can bird/count retraceable routes, but ONLY species/count not seen. Time is still ticking, but distance is NOT.
